- The website redesign and recruiting Beta testers for the final phase. This phase will be very short, and we expect to announce the new website to the general membership very soon.
- The GSG Board recently authorized the revival of our educational webinars. We will offer these quarterly webinars with topics designed to encourage growth in our members' speaking careers. SOCIETY COLUMN

When I was working in the GSG booth at the NGS conference in St. Charles, several society representatives asked me why speakers charge so much, or stated that their society could not afford a speaker. Before answering, I asked a couple of questions:

- 1. *Did they have a budget line item for speakers?* Often answered "no."
- 2. Who were they trying to hire? Frequently this was an "in-demand" speaker.

I was able to counter these answers with information from my experience as a lecturer (20 years) and a full-charge bookkeeper for several small corporations (22 years).

Societies would be wise to include a line item in their budgets for paying speakers. An offer to pay should be made to anyone, member or not, who presents an informational talk or lecture, with or without a slideshow or handouts, at their meeting. Every speaker spends time researching and preparing their presentations and this time should be honored with a reimbursement.

The dollar amount entered for this line item will depend on the number of speakers the society wants to host per year, but at least \$50-\$150 to cover one speaker per year.

Currently, a society can find many professional speakers who charge \$150 per one-hour lecture and have charged this amount for the last five to ten years. This fee, which is based on their budgeted income and expenses, is required by the IRS to prevent the speaker's business from being labeled a hobby which would force several speakers out of business.

Societies that want to hire "in demand" speakers must realize their fees are justifiably higher due to increased time spent developing and improving lectures, travel and other expenses, and the law of "supply and demand." A society may well benefit from paying the higher fee for someone with a widely recognized name by drawing a much larger audience, which can thus attract new visitors and, perhaps, new members.

If the fee would "break" the budget, a society might consider saving up for a couple years or approaching neighboring societies to share the expense.

Along with lecture fees, speakers will ask to be reimbursed for travel, lodging, and meals. Don't hesitate to negotiate expenses. Many speakers will agree to overnighting with a society member they know.

My suggestions for finding and hiring a speaker:

- First, don't just consider the geographic location of the speaker. Look for a topic that will interest your audience.
- Next, look for a speaker who lectures on your topic choice. The Genealogical Speakers Guild directory (https://www.genealogicalspeakersguild.org/) will let you search our members by Keyword.
- Finally, contact the speaker and see if they will negotiate. Sometimes speakers will have scheduled other lectures nearby, or may want to visit your area to do genealogical research, or to visit relatives and friends.

You just never know what might happen until you ask.

Speak! Policies

Speak!, the quarterly newsletter of the Genealogical Speakers Guild, is published in March, June, September, and December. The deadline for submission of articles and other material for the newsletter is the 15th of the prior month (15 February, 15 May, 15 August, and 15 November).

As stated in Article II of the Bylaws of the Genealogical Speakers Guild (as amended and restated May 2004), the objectives of GSG shall be

- To provide a unified, effective voice to promote speakers' interests by providing a forum for the discussion of topics of concern to genealogical speakers;
- 2 To broaden the speaker base by identifying, educating, and assisting promising speakers;
- 3. To raise professional lecture standards; and
- 4. To aid speakers in understanding and fulfilling their obligations to program planners and to audiences.

Guidelines for Submitting Feature Articles Prior to submitting a feature article, authors are requested to review the newsletter guidelines outlined in this document (*Speak!* Policies) and submit article topic to *Speak!* editor, Lauren Maehrlein (*editor@genealogicalspeakersguild.org*), for approval. Unsolicited articles will be returned to the author along with a copy of *Speak!* Policies.

- Articles must address a topic directly related to genealogical speaking.
- Articles should be no more than 2,000 words.
- Book reviews should be no more than 750 words.
- The editor retains the right of acceptance of all articles, news, and announcements.
- The editor retains the right to edit articles for accuracy, clarity, and length. Articles will be edited to conform to the latest edition of *The Chicago Manual of Style*.
- Authors retain their copyright.
- First-time submissions should be accompanied by a short (75 words or fewer) bio of the author and a photo. Both will be printed with the article when published.
- Not all articles submitted may be accepted for publication.
- Articles may not be published in the order in which they are received. The editor will balance content and topics throughout the year.
- Articles by non-members will be considered when space permits.

These guidelines do not apply to member news, calls for papers, or other notices and/or announcements submitted by GSG members. Adopted November 2010; updated January 2015.
