What started your interest in genealogy?

Cynthia then completed the Boston U. Certificate course which she believes to be the biggest influence on her genealogical journey.

Her speaking career began after she was encouraged by other members of her APG Heartland Chapter, which pulls its membership from Kansas, Missouri, Iowa, and Nebraska. Her thought was, "if they can do it—I can do it!!" Now Cynthia speaks locally, regionally, and nationally, often relying

Member News

Speak! is happy to showcase the achievements and milestones of our members. This issue provides a progress report on the important book being written by long-time member and Guild Director,Sheila Benedict. Its working title is Oral History for Family Historians: Separating Fact from Fiction.

The book I am writing has several goals: it is a handbook for anyone doing oral interviews and writing the history; a teaching tool to instruct how to conduct interviews; some of the equipment that's needed and how that equipment is used; what types of questions to ask; and so forth. It is also a reminder that **oral history requires using accurate source citations,** thereby becoming a valuable part of the research and analysis process. There is no experience level that cannot benefit from oral history: from beginners to advanced researchers.

Some years ago, when teaching beginning genealogy at a local community college, one fact I stressed was that the interviews are an important part of researching a family and NOT a substitute for others. However, because the responses are usually part fact and part fiction, a genealogist needs to research the information to eliminate the fiction and verify the facts. That is a strong component of the total body of work genealogists gather in order to formulate a well-documented, verified family history, and part of a reasonably exhaustive search. It is important to be able to take the information, research and evaluate relevance and reliability, and know how and what to ask, where it is done, what is the right time, and who should be interviewed.

LINDSEY HARNER

Lindsey Harner, of Williamsport, Pennsylvania, is a newer member of the GSG, having joined the organization in 2023 after visiting the booth at the NGS Family History Conference in Richmond.

A decade ago, after giving her sister a gift subscription to Ancestry, Lindsey was intrigued by all the information her sister found and couldn't resist trying it herself. Her love of American history and of puzzle solving combined to draw her to genealogy.

Lindsey began her speaking career a year ago in a unique way. Her first speaking engagement resulted from an article she wrote for *Family Tree Magazine*. Her next came through the Association of Professional Genealogists' online directory. She has spoken to her local genealogical society, and further afield via Zoom. Her specialties include researching central Pennsylvania, uncovering ancestors' occupations, finding parents using indirect evidence, federal census records, and she is currently booked to provide a talk on reconciling conflicting birth dates.

Lindsey enjoys sharing her family's history and the research lessons she's learned with other genealogists, and often gets lost in the presentation. The two live webinars via Zoom she's given were both very positive experiences and gave her the opportunity to connect with and speak to groups in other parts of the country. She recommends signing on early before the presentation to work out any technical issues that may crop up. Interacting with the audience using



quizzes or other forms of engagement tools, such as AhaSlides or Slido, allow audience members to participate by texting comments or answers to questions in real-time. Additionally, she advises providing a link for your website and/or blog before the presentation to allow the audience to scan and familiarize themselves with you and your expertise. Also, QR codes can be created and incorporated into a presentation to help audience members find your website easily.

Advice on getting started? There are many genealogy groups that are constantly looking for speakers, so don't be afraid to start contacting them, introduce yourself, and pitch them some ideas. Just make sure your ideas are clear and focused. When you schedule a



lecture, use social media to promote the event. Find genealogy groups in the area you're speaking and post about the event to their social pages. Check out Canva to find free templates to create graphics for the event.

In addition to the Genealogical Speakers Guild, Lindsey is a member of the Association of Professional Genealogists, the National Genealogical Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, and her local Lycoming County Genealogical Society.

Speak! Policies

Speak!, the quarterly newsletter of the Genealogical Speakers Guild, is published in March, June, September, and December. The deadline for submission of articles and other material for the newsletter is the 15th of the prior month (15 February, 15 May, 15 August, and 15 November).

As stated in Article II of the Bylaws of the Genealogical Speakers Guild (as amended and restated May 2004), the objectives of GSG shall be

- 1. To provide a unified, effective voice to promote speakers' interests by providing a forum for the discussion of topics of concern to genealogical speakers;
- 2. To broaden the speaker base by identifying, educating, and assisting promising speakers;
- 3. To raise professional lecture standards; and
- 4. To aid speakers in understanding and fulfilling their obligations to program planners and to audiences.

Guidelines for Submitting Feature Articles Prior to submitting a feature article, authors are requested to review the newsletter guidelines outlined in this document (*Speak!* Policies) and submit article topic to *Speak!* editor, Lauren Maehrlein (*editor@genealogicalspeakersguild.org*), for approval. Unsolicited articles will be returned to the author along with a copy of *Speak!* Policies.

- Articles must address a topic directly related to genealogical speaking.
- Articles should be no more than 2,000 words.
- Book reviews should be no more than 750 words.
- The editor retains the right of acceptance of all articles, news, and announcements.
- The editor retains the right to edit articles for accuracy, clarity, and length. Articles will be edited to conform to the latest edition of *The Chicago Manual of Style*.
- Authors retain their copyright.
- First-time submissions should be accompanied by a short (75 words or fewer) bio of the author and a photo. Both will be printed with the article when published.
- Not all articles submitted may be accepted for publication.
- Articles may not be published in the order in which they are received. The editor will balance content and topics throughout the year.
- Articles by non-members will be considered when space permits.

These guidelines do not apply to member news, calls for papers, or other notices and/or announcements submitted by GSG members. Adopted November 2010; updated January 2015.
